# Keeneland 2018 a Success!

Perfect weather made for a great event with turnout over 200 strong for this year's Keeneland event. This has become a great spring tradition for the chapter and alumni. Despite lack of a house, Grand Master Jackson Skeeters announced to the crowd that the chapter is over 100 strong and had the best spring rush on campus. The message is that we cannot expect this success to continue without a permanent housing solution and need your support now.

The big news of the day was the announcement of the "Finish Line Matching Campaign" that will get us to groundbreaking this fall. A \$300,000 matching fund has been established to support getting the chapter house to groundbreaking this fall by matching all gifts of \$5,000 or more! We need to raise the other \$300,000 in order to reach the \$1.8M needed to break ground. We are off to a good start with Tom Caywood '79, Ted Fist '88, Brian Heck '91, Raymond Lyle '83, William "C" Morton '86, Ron Owen '69, Tony Walker '68, and Lee Webb '94 stepping up to sign their pledges at the event or shortly after, and Larry Blair '70, Roger Baird '72, Bill Corum '63, Bob Droste '76, Bill Leavell '72, Ben Sewell '67, and Scott Shirley '85 added to their existing pledges! We have crossed over the \$100k mark and need to



keep the momentum going into late summer and early fall.

The matching campaign goes through the Hall of Fame event on September 28, but in order to break ground this fall we need the ~60 donors committed to this matching gift program.

# <u>GM Report</u>

This past year was a great success for the Beta-Nu chapter. In the fall semester, we had an outstanding rush week which led to the addition of nine new members. We then followed that up with another fantastic rush week in the spring semester which led to twelve new members and one of the biggest rush classes on the University of Kentucky's campus. We saw significant improvement academically as we were released from academic probation following the fall semester. This enabled the chapter to have overall successful and fun date parties with the wonderful ladies of Delta Gamma and Pi Beta Phi.

The Beta-Nu chapter was outstanding when it came to philanthropy this year. As always we paired with Pi Beta Phi to host the annual Greek Bowl, a flag football tournament that raises money for the Wounded Warrior Project. We are excited to say that this year's Greek Bowl raised \$3,000 for the Wounded Warrior Project. We also paired with Alpha Phi for the annual Veteran's Day Luncheon, which raised an additional \$200 for the Wounded Warrior Project. This year, two active members of the chapter participated in Dance Blue, a 24-hour dance marathon that has raised over \$11 million dollars in the fight against pediatric cancer over the past 12 years. This past year alone Dance Blue raised over \$1 million and we are honored to be able to say we played a part in it. Along with Delta Gamma, the chapter hosted the second annual Kappa DoGs, a philanthropy event that raises money for the Lexington Humane Society. We paired with Alpha Phi to host the 1st annual Toy Drive right before Christmas and, due to its huge success, we plan to host it again next year. After the devastation brought on by hurricane Harvey, we raised \$300 for hurricane relief. On the Stephen Alonzo Jackson Day of Giving we raised \$1,624. We saw a great amount of participation amongst our members in our own philanthropy events, but also saw a great amount of participation amongst our members in philanthropy events put on by various organizations including: Chi Omega and Delta Sigma Phi's Make-a-Wish Foundation Golf Scramble, the Dance Blue 5K, Delta Gamma's Anchor Splash, Delta Gamma's Anchor Slam, Kappa Delta's Mr. UK, Dance Blue's Last Bag Standing, Sigma Alpha Epsilon's Main Event, Phi Kappa Tau's Dodge for a Cause, and more.

I am also proud to say that participation in community service improved greatly this past year. I'd particularly like to praise our members who dedicated their time twice a week in the fall and winter to coach youth basketball teams at the local YMCA and to those members who were recently accepted into the Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Bluegrass. We anticipate continued improvement in the area of community service next year.

As always the annual Alumni Tailgate hosted at Keeneland Racecourse was a great time. On that day, we not only managed to have fun, but we managed to raise money for the new house we are all very excited about. We are proud to say we have now secured \$1.58 million of the \$1.8 million dollars needed to break ground thanks to the House Corporation cash and 193 donors.

### Aiden Skeeters '16


Hometown: Crestwood, KY Major: Human Health Sciences; Minor: Business Year in School: Junior (2020)
